Student Entrepreneurs Win Big!

Shaw University student entrepreneurs achieved remarkable success in the Main Street Entrepreneurship Accelerator program, offered by Wake Tech Community College and available to Shaw University students through a partnership with the Shaw University Innovation and Entrepreneurship Center, winning first and second place in the program's business plan pitch competition. The Accelerator required students to pitch their businesses in a rigorous elimination round process with the final competition occurring on May 3.

NEAM Technology Solutions, a development company that aims to provide outstanding value to people and entities through software, secured the first-place prize of \$25,000. Led by Shaw University alumni Elikem Des-Amekudi (CEO) and Andrew Anglin, and current students Blaise Dampier and Nicholas Perez, the company used their winnings to further develop a mobile app designed to enhance educational success. Dampier represented the group in the business pitch competition.

Devin Versteegen, a Shaw University student and owner of DT Media & Rentals, claimed the second-place prize of \$7,500. His business offers photography, cinematography, and equipment rental services. His winnings enabled him to expand his equipment inventory and network within his industry.

Five Shaw University students successfully completed the Entrepreneurship for Skilled Trades and Professionals course in partnership with Wake Tech Community College. This course paved the way for participation in the Main Street Entrepreneurship Accelerator program, where students competed for a



combined grant of \$42,500 to fund their business ideas.

Business Major Field Test Scores Soar

The Pursuit of Excellence Is Paying Off!

Student performance on the Major Field Test (MFT) in Business has improved significantly this year. In April 2023, of the 17 students who completed the standardized test, four scored at the 99th percentile. The mean score for Shaw University students from the 2023 cohort was by far the highest since the institution first utilized the test in 2011. Also of note, 57% of students from the nationwide comparison group scored below the mean score of Shaw University students. The comparison group consisted of 16,732 examinees (seniors) from 274 domestic institutions that completed the MFT during the period of September 2021

through June 2022.

Honda STEAM Grant Boosts Child Development Center

In Spring 2023, Honda awarded a \$25,000 STEAM grant to the Shaw University Center for Early Childhood Education, Development and Research. The funds provided resources for the Center to obtain custom STEAM-focused wall murals, take a field trip to the Museum of Life and Science in Durham, NC, create a raised garden bed for classrooms to grow fresh produce to taste, and purchase iPads to stimulate science and math exploration.


Intern Feedback

Summer High-Tech Immersion Camp Delivers

The Department of Computer Science, in collaboration with the Center for Cybersecurity Education and Research, offered the second annual High-Tech Summer Immersion Program for middle and high school students. The program is designed to introduce and encourage participants to consider a career in tech by exposing them to various topics, such as computer systems, networking, cybersecurity, and programming, through interactive and hands-on activities. This year, 21 students participated in the weeklong camp administered by Dr. James Brown, Dr. Nyteisha Bookert, Mrs. Patsy O'Neal Andrade and three undergraduate students sponsored by the National Transportation and Infrastructure Agency Connecting Minority Communities grant (Rita James, Eduardo Pires Do Prado Valenca, and Christopher Hurd). The camp was funded through an Amazon gift deployed through Cyber.org Project REACH.

Computer Science Department Enrollment Increases

The Department of Computer Science experienced a 43% increase in fall-to-fall enrollment from Fall 2022 to Fall 2023. Though both the Computer Science and Computer Information Systems programs grew, most of the increase is attributable to the Cyber Operations program which jumped from 0 students to 20 students.

The prestigious organization prepares black engineers to excel academically and professionally. 
