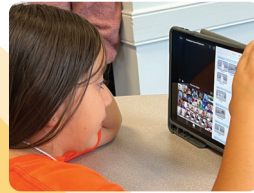

Girls' Summer Tech Camp Makes Big Impact

Starting on June 27, the School of Business & Professional Studies hosted a four-day camp on campus titled, "Girls Can C2," which stands for Girls Can Code and Create – a reference to STEM-focused instruction in computer programming. The free, community-based technology program for girls ages 6-12 years old reached registration capacity (20) very quickly and met daily from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. At the end of the program, participants were able to code and use Apple digital tools to design.

The girls bonded throughout the four days. Not only did they code and create, but they also collaborated. By the final day, many new friendships had formed. During the closing program, proud parents were amazed as their daughters demonstrated their newly-developed skills.

Shaw University is the first HBCU in the nation to achieve CEO Cancer Gold Standard Employer Status



CEO Gold Standard Accreditation Achieved

Shaw University joined the Gold Standard Community, receiving accreditation as a Gold Standard employer from the CEO Roundtable on Cancer. Gold Standard employer recognition is extended to universities that champion health and well-being by advancing prevention, diagnosis, and quality treatment of cancer for students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents and communities. Barbara Powell-Jackson, Gold Community Engagement Coordinator and an adjunct professor in the School of Business and Professional Studies, led the accreditation process. She said: "This is an honor – a great accomplishment that speaks volumes for the Shaw University legacy and our stance as we continue to embrace, empower and educate our community."

Robert A. Ingram, founding chairman

of the CEO Roundtable on Cancer, said in a statement to the university: "As the first Historically Black College and University to earn Gold Standard accreditation, I trust Shaw's example will inspire other HBCUs to embrace the tenets of the Gold Standard and bring the life-saving benefits of cancer prevention, early detection and quality of care to their employees, students and communities."

The CEO Roundtable on Cancer's Going for Gold program is a multi-year initiative in partnership with HBCUs and other organizations to make continual progress toward the elimination of cancer. Through initiatives that reduce the risk of cancer, enable early diagnosis, facilitate access to treatment, and hasten the discovery of effective therapies, this can be a reality.

SBPS Awarded \$600,000 Federal Grant

The federal government's Minority Business Development Agency awarded a \$600,000 (over two years) grant to Shaw University to support undergraduate entrepreneurship education. Principal investigator and project director, Dean Lynette Wood and Dr. Nichole Phillips, sought funding for the project, "Creating the **Business Innovation Gateway (BIG)**" which will develop and expand entrepreneurship curricula over the next two years. Prof. Matthew Gargano and Prof. Hanif Omar will serve as program fellows.

This is a major accomplishment for the School of Business and Professional Studies. Dean Wood said, "It was a competitive application, with a very, very short turnaround time - which required working through a holiday weekend. The sacrifice that was made to meet the deadline was worth it. What's ahead for undergraduate entrepreneurship education at Shaw University is going to be BIG!!!"

The North Carolina Bankers Association is offering Shaw business school students a unique opportunity to become successful leaders in the banking industry by launching its Future Bank Leaders (FBL) program. FBL builds relationships between students and bank leaders through on-campus meetings, mentoring, career guidance, scholarships, internships, jobs, content and more. Interested students can take advantage by registering for the Spring 2023 semester Special Topics course, Credit Essentials Certificate, which promises to be a fun, real-world way to learn banking basics from instructors who are professional bankers telling true stories of their successes...and setbacks. Typically, students passing the class are offered paid summer internships by NC banks, which then offer many of them exciting, well-paying jobs upon graduation.

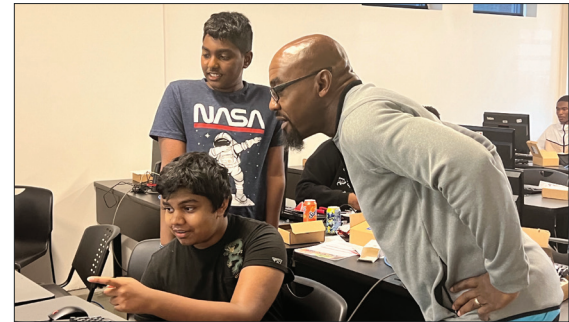
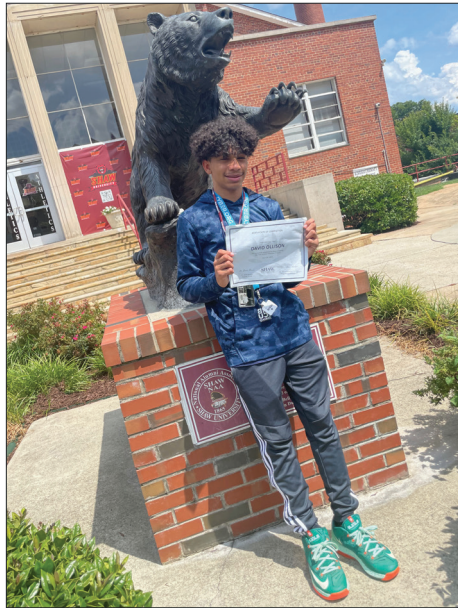
Computer Science Hosts High-Tech Immersion Camp

Shaw's computer science program hosted a High-Tech Summer Immersion Program for middle and high school students on July 28 and 29, thanks to the generous sponsorship of the Cybersecurity & Infrastructure Security Administration and Cyber.org Project REACH. Participants received fundamental introductions to cybersecurity, programming, game development and networking. While in the camp, the students worked with Raspberry Pis (mini computers) to build fully-functional PCs and received the devices as gifts on the last day.

Willie Henderson, Cyber Education Specialist from Cyber.org, provided follow-up reflections that speak volumes: *"The experience at Shaw was nothing but top notch from the amazing staff in the Willie Gary Student Center who provided the delicious breakfast, lunch, and snacks, to the campus tour Dr. Brown led us on which exposed the students to the history of Shaw. NSF Awards Grant to Cybersecurity Program

The National Science Foundation has funded Shaw University's project, "Catalyst Project: Increasing Access and Inclusiveness in Cybersecurity through Lab Experiences" for \$199,797. We applaud principal investigator, Dr. James Brown, and co-principal investigator, Dr. Robert Holland, for the high-quality proposal. Receiving this award is especially noteworthy since the acceptance rate for NSF grants is very low.

Historic Technology Articulation Agreement Signed with Wake Tech Community College

In the spirit of academic cooperation and with the goal of offering students additional pathways for academic success, Shaw University and Wake Technical Community College (WTCC) signed a historic technology articulation agreement beginning in the fall 2022 semester – allowing WTCC course credits to transfer from Wake Tech to Shaw toward completion of a four-year college degree. The terms of the agreement apply to standard course-based degree programs for undergraduate students.

According to the agreement, any Wake Tech student enrolling at Shaw may transfer up to 70 credit hours toward a bachelor's degree. All academic coursework completed at Wake Tech for which a student has earned a grade of C- or higher is fully transferable to Shaw University. Transfer students can complete four-year degrees in Computer Science - General Concentration or in Computer Science - Cyber Operations Concentration.

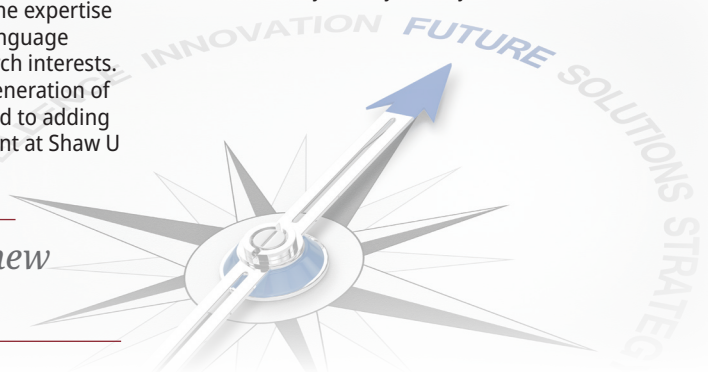

Dr. Smith Awarded Policy Fellowship

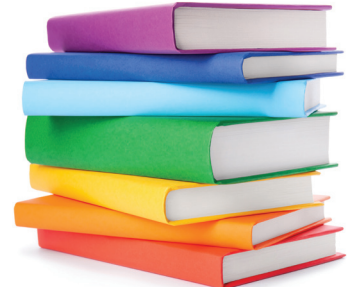
