

Education & Child Development Department Welcomes National Center for Teacher Residencies

The Department of Education and Child Development hosted the National Center for Teacher Residencies (NCTR) NC10 Cohort Institute on March 26. This daylong event highlighted projects and progression of the \$115,000 grant that was awarded to the department by NCTR in October 2023. Educators from HBCUs in surrounding areas also attended and contributed to a robust exchange of differing and shared perspectives.

The NCTR grant helps students majoring in Elementary Education, Birth-Kindergarten and Early Childhood Development with stipends for tuition. It also assists with mentorship and recruitment of new teacher education students. Department head and principal investigator for the grant, Dr. Lucy Wilson, was pleased that Shaw University was selected as the venue for the NCTR meeting.

IEC Gets In On the Ground Floor of Success

rom a flooded storage area to a modern workspace—the ground floor of Tupper Hall is now home to the Innovation & Entrepreneurship Center (IEC). The center serves as the hub for its key programs: BIG, MOVE, and SparkPlug.

A collaboration space, conference room, three faculty offices, and a reception area are housed in the newly-renovated space. Furnishings and decor items, intentionally selected to be welcoming and energizing, create an inviting environment for entrepreneurship activities.

BearsTank and IdeasFest

On November 16, 2023, the IEC hosted its annual BearsTank Business Plan Showcase along with the first annual IdeasFest Competition. Developed by Professor Hanif Omar, BearsTank is the culminating project for students enrolled in the ENT 301 Entrepreneurship course. Seven students presented business plans representing ventures including real estate investment, accounting consulting, and logistics.

IdeasFest provides students with a budding business idea the opportunity to pitch it to a panel of judges to receive feedback on its feasibility and guidance on development. IdeasFest featured five student participants pitching ideas

including wellness journals, healthy vending machines, and headphones designed for mental health.

We congratulate Troyawanee Davis, winner of IdeasFest, for her car seat assistive technology and Messiah Davis, winner of the "Fan Favorite" award for his health care transportation venture.

HBCU-Start

In January 2024, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Club VP Louichard Benjamin and member Alaya Mack were selected to attend the HBCU-Start@ MiamiHerbert program, a residential program for aspiring entrepreneurs from underrepresented groups from HBCUs and Caribbean schools and universities. Benjamin and Mack were among 18 students who were immersed in the University of Miami's entrepreneurial ecosystem, receiving training from leading entrepreneurship faculty and successful entrepreneurs.

The program concluded with Team Pitch, a pitch competition where teams of participants presented a business plan for cash prizes. Louichard Benjamin's team placed first in the competition, and Alaya Mack's team placed second. Congratulations to them both!

Cyber Lab Is Live

In Fall 2022, Shaw University launched a B.S. in Cyber Operations degree program focused on ethical hacking, malware analysis, and networking. As a result, the university became one of two Historically Black Colleges or Universities (HBCUs) nationwide and one of two universities in North Carolina with an offensive cybersecurity program. The Center for Cybersecurity Education and Research (C-CER) was also launched to increase minority representation in cybersecurity through academic offerings, outreach activities, and research.

In building the degree program and the

center, initial challenges included obtaining computer equipment with the capabilities of running sophisticated computer environments and algorithms, such as multiple virtual machines and machine learning algorithms. External grant funding provided physical equipment through the establishment of a security operations center (SOC) lab and a general study computer lab with similar capabilities. The SOC Lab (pictured above) has been used by students to participate in the National Collegiate Cybersecurity Competition. Students also use the lab as part of the Cy(Bear)security Research Group which focuses on Internet of Things (IoT) security using Artificial Immune Systems and Machine Learning.



As recruitment efforts ramp up, Computer Science is rolling out a variety of attention-grabbing tools designed to keep potential students focused on important opportunities for their futures. From banners and a booklet to a convention tent and wall wrap, the department makes a bold statement (in English and in Spanish).





Edge to Cloud Learning Experience Works

On February 29, eight Shaw University students were invited to participate in the Red Hat Edge to Cloud Learning Experience. For this workshop, students used a Red Hat-provided cloud development environment to write a Python microservice that interacts with other microservices. They also developed using Python programming to connect to remote services and query traffic data with credentials provided during the event.



As April 15 — the deadline for filing income taxes — approaches, many students in the Department of Management and Accounting don't sweat that because most of them emerge from their course of study having passed the Internal Revenue Service's test to

become certified tax preparers.

In fact, during February, March and April, a team of students prepared 2023 income tax returns for taxpayers in the community as volunteers at Shaw University's official Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site. VITA is an IRS initiative supporting free tax preparation for underserved individuals. "Some clients have had their taxes prepared by our students three years in a row. That trust says a lot," said Dean Wood. "Though the curriculum is rigorous, this department consistently houses the largest major at the university. The faculty in that area are committed to preparing students for successful careers, consistent with the mission of the business school."

Dr. Cassandra Burney teaches the tax course and coordinates the VITA site. She recognizes that the required class is feared by many students but is very pleased that semester after semester, a high percentage of students not only pass the course but also earn the IRS VITA certification. This achievement is not by accident. The instructional approach was modified in 2020, and the results speak for themselves.

"The students participating in the VITA

program have three certifications: the standard of conduct, quality review and the basic level, which covers tax topics such as deductions, credits, retirement income and investment income," Burney said. "Their commitment to accuracy and attention to detail is truly impressive, ensuring that each client receives the best possible service. The VITA program not only benefits those receiving assistance but also provides valuable real-world experience for the students involved."

Shaw University junior Janiyah Hagood, who is majoring in business administration-management, said, "Obtaining the VITA certification has

impacted me by allowing me to be exposed to and explore the opportunities in the tax accounting profession. It has helped me grow as a young woman in the professional and real world."

The department's faculty combine academic and experiential learning with strategic partnerships and active civic engagement. In addition, "They regularly go outside of the classroom and office to connect with their students," Wood said. "The sacrifice is resulting in more competent and confident business majors who are securing coveted, high-paying internships at some of the largest firms in the world."




