Shaw's Department of Education has earned national accreditation by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP), demonstrating excellence in the areas of content and pedagogy, clinical experiences, selectivity, program impact, and capacity for continuous improvement.

Dr. Renata Dusenbury, Vice President for Academic Affairs, affirmed the accomplishment, "The continued and recent reaffirmation of our Education programs by both local (North Carolina Department of Public Instruction) and national (Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation - widely considered as the top teaching program-specific accreditation) accrediting agencies confirms what we have known for years. Shaw University possesses several outstanding Education Preparatory Programs, all of which produce graduates well equipped to address both the educational and diversity needs of our community."

A five-member onsite review team visited Shaw's campus at the end of 2019 to validate the five standards. The findings revealed that all standards were met. This

accreditation status is effective between Spring 2020 and Spring 2027. The next site visit will take place in Fall 2026.


High Scores Achieved on NC Teacher Exam-PPAT

The Department of Education proudly announces that for two consecutive years an average of 92 percent of the education graduates met or exceeded the average score of 38 on the Praxis Performance Assessment Test (PPAT). The PPAT was designed to verify that teachers are ready for the classroom before they receive a license to teach. The PPAT contains four tasks aligned to national teaching standards: **Task 1** – knowledge

of students and the learning environment; **Task 2** – assessment and data collection to measure and inform student learning; **Task 3** – designing instruction for student learning; and **Task 4** – implementing and analyzing instruction to promote student learning.

Former Prisoner Turned Business Owner Shares Sweet Success with Entrepreneurship Class

On September 16, master baker Keijuane Hester shared with students in ENT 301 Entrepreneurship his recipe for phenomenal business success. Today, he owns Durham-based bakery Favor Desserts which services over 1,000 customers a week, but his life hasn't always been so sweet. Following high school, Keijuane was convicted for selling cocaine, and while in prison he reluctantly worked in the kitchen—where he learned to bake.

His engaging story of personal transformation and business success captivated the class. The instructor, Prof. Hanif Omar, reported that "The Cake Man" was the first of several entrepreneurs scheduled to present to the students throughout the semester.




Faculty Bears Join Oracle Academy

Oracle, the largest database company in the world, has entered into an agreement with Shaw University to help Computer Information Systems/Computer Science faculty develop core computing knowledge and skills aligned to industry demands using current technologies.

Institutions like Shaw must have access to the right resources to help ensure students achieve post-graduation success. The company provides the university with classroom learning resources, software, cloud technology, and practice environments.





ASPIRE to Boost Area Entrepreneurship

Certification program addresses critical success strategies for black entrepreneurs in Raleigh and beyond.

Entrepreneurship is touted as a means of economic empowerment. However, for Black entrepreneurs, the road can be tough. Whites are twice as likely as Blacks to be in business for themselves, but new businesses are started at a higher rate by Blacks than Whites. Unfortunately, the failure rate among Black businesses is also higher.

To reduce the disconnect between desire and outcome that exists for Black entrepreneurs, the Shaw University Aspire entrepreneurship certification program was created to provide training to increase revenue, improve efficiency in operations, and build the confidence of aspiring and early-stage Black entrepreneurs located in the Raleigh-Durham area (and beyond).

Aspire has a six-module curriculum covering business essentials, opportunity recognition, money management, marketing, business operations and presentations/communication. Content will be delivered over 16 weeks with modules ranging from 1 to 4 weeks in length.



SCORE and Shaw Offer Business Plan Preparation Series

Shaw University has partnered with Raleigh SCORE to assist business owners in their quest to create a viable business plan, a critical factor in the short and long term success of any business. The 13-week series started September 3 and takes the participant step by step through the process of creating a winning business plan.

A course of this magnitude normally would cost thousands of dollars, but it is being offered free due to the collaborative efforts of Raleigh SCORE and the Shaw School of Business and Professional Studies. Hanif Omar, who directs Shaw's Innova-

tion and Entrepreneurship Center, only has superlatives to describe the value of the comprehensive course, described as a treasure trove of information.

The workshop facilitators, all successful African-American business owners themselves, cover a wide range of topics including, Understanding the Difference Between an Entrepreneur and a Business Owner, Market Research for Customer Identification, Risk Mitigation and Navigating Obstacles and Setbacks, and Identifying and Setting Financial Goals.

An average of over 70 participants attend

live each Thursday evening, and recorded sessions are available to be viewed by others later. "The program is exceeding my expectations in every way," remarked Patti Williams, certified SCORE mentor and coordinator for the series. SBPS Dean Lynette Wood attends every session. "I am so impressed with the content of the presentations and the professionalism, positivity and dedication of the SCORE facilitators," she states. "Kudos to Dr. Angie Arrington, Jay Graves, Bill Davis, Sharon Shelton, Darlene Thorne, and Patti Williams for modeling excellence and commitment."
